The Main Event for Collectors - Antiques for Everyone at the NEC

Antiques for Everyone, Britain's leading summer antiques and art fair, returns to the National Exhibition Centre, Birmingham from $19^{th} - 22^{nd}$ July 2012. Specialist dealers from across the country promise a huge range of fine art, decorative antiques, traditional period pieces and 20^{th} century and Modernist collector's items with prices to suit buyers at every level.

Now in its 27th year, the fair is a major marketplace and meeting point for dealers and collectors from across the world. The mix and range of exhibits is vast and eclectic, and visitors will discover



leading specialists across the fair. Glass and ceramics dealers show everything from Chinese Tang figures to early English pottery, Minton dinner sets and 1940s Wedgwood; furniture specialists from as far as Glasgow and Sussex provide stunning displays of traditional 17th and 18th century pieces to 20th century Art Deco and Scottish Arts & Crafts; while art galleries display colourful art and sculpture spanning Georgian topographic engravings to miniature portrait miniatures, Victorian landscapes, fine English watercolours, 20th century Northern School paintings, Modern British and contemporary works.

The fair is very popular with collectors of decorative design. No other event in the country offers such a broad range of designer pieces, from Fabergé to Trifari, Goldscheider to Chiparus, Gallé to Mdina, Moorcroft to Keith Murray, Clarice Cliff to Bernard Leach and Voysey to Fornasetti.

Every summer, more than 20,000 visitors visit the fair during four hectic days and several thousand exhibits change hands. Exhibits are vetted for quality and authenticity by specialist committees empowered to remove from sale any item that fails to meet the thorough criteria designed to ensure buyers can make their purchases in confidence.

The fair is divided into two sections, with plush room-set and gallery style displays adjacent to rows of eye-catching specialist and general stands.

Special Feature

The Worcester Porcelain Museum will be contributing to a special feature display at the summer fair. The Worcester Porcelain Museum houses the world's largest collection of Worcester Porcelain, in addition to archives and records of factory production that form the primary resource for the study of Worcester porcelain and its history.

Other specialist dealers provide Persian and Oriental carpets, Folk art and samplers, French and English dolls and toys, farming tools, kitchen antiques, etchings, arms and armour, mezzotints and antiquarian maps, fireside metalwork, portrait miniatures, Japanese Imari, original cartoon artwork, watches, barometers, original book illustrations, and all kinds of decorative collectables.

The fair features many members of the UK's two leading trade associations, BADA and LAPADA, whose members are governed by strict codes of conduct. The fair is organised by Clarion Events at the NEC and has been running since 1986.
